with the appearance of a textbook as comprehensive as this one it is clear that the field of geriatrics is coming of age the broad scope of these volumes shapes a substantial answer to the question what is geriatrics and why should we be interested in it as i see it there are at least five reasons first the scientific or intellectual reason gerontology is the study of aging from the biologic psychological and social perspectives there is increasing interest in the fascinating insights into the biologic mechanisms of aging errors in protein synthesis dna repair mechanisms alterations of the neuroendocrine system changes in the immune system genetic controls and somatic mutations second the demographic reason this is the century of old age there has been a 26 year gain in the average life expectancy this gain compares with that acquired from 3 000 years b c the bronze age to the year 1900 which was about 29 years therefore in one century there has been a gain in the average life expectancy almost equal to 5 000 previous years of human history in 1830 one of three newborn infants survived beyond 60 years of age

as the baby boomers age concerns over healthcare systems abilities to accommodate geriatric patients grow increasingly challenging this is especially true with the population

deemed to be the oldest of the old specifically those over the age of 85 unlike any other time in history this demographic is the fastest growing segment of most developed countries in the united states the oldest old is projected to double from 4.3 million to 9.6 million by 2030 the increased life expectancy of the population since the early 1900s has been built on the improvement of living conditions diet public health and advancement in medical care with this we have seen a steady decline in the age specific prevalence of vascular and heart diseases stroke and even dementia older persons are healthier today than their counterparts decades ago more importantly than in any other age group the care of the oldest old must be individualized management decisions should be made taking into consideration the older persons expressed wishes quality of life function and mental capacity the inevitable consequence is that there will be an increase in the prevalence of older persons with chronic diseases multiple co existing pathologies and neuro degenerative diseases the oldest of the aging population are often excluded from drug trials and their treatments are largely based on findings extrapolated from that of the younger old furthermore among the oldest old physiologically they are more diverse than other segments of the population their demographic characteristics are unparalleled and different compared to that of the younger old several studies have drawn attention to the differing attitudes among health professionals towards elderly people and many show prejudice because they are old as a result the use of age as a criteria in determining the appropriateness of treatment is of very limited validity yet there are limited resources that guide physicians through these challenges this book creates a greater awareness of these challenges and offers practical guidelines for working within the infrastructures vital to this demographic this book is designed for geriatricians primary care physicians junior medical officers specialty geriatrics nurses and gerontologists it is divided into 3 sections general considerations chronic diseases and geriatric syndromes each chapter provides a summary of important and essential information under the heading of key points case studies are included in some of the chapters to highlight the principles of management

persons recently has received disproportionate attention in discussions of ethics and clinical care age alone of course should not generate special focus on ill individuals about whom concerns arise based on value conflicts tacitly involved in the delivery of health care having said that age is not the principal criterion for attention to ethics based concerns in health care it must be acknowledged that old people have a high prevalence of conditions that provoke interest and put them in harms way if value conflicts are not identified and seriously addressed issues that concern autonomy the allocation of scarce resources inter generational competition and conflict the withholding of treatment in treatable disease and substitute and proxy decision making for the cognitively impaired all have special relevance for older persons

prior to the evolution of modern medicine with its superabundance of diagnostic and therapeutic medical technology and the rise of the litigious society the value of clinical skills was evident in both history taking and the physical examination even today physicians can make a correct diagnosis solely by utilizing their clinical skills in about 90 of patient encounters furthermore in the past physicians understood their role as a psychologist and were more apt to be familiar with the social context of their patients house calls were common the doctor was also a placebo who at his best inspired hope and probably sped recovery geriatricians use both clinical skills and take advantage of modern technology sparingly for they know they are dealing with the most challenging and frail of patients older patients who so often present with multiple complex interacting behavioral social and physical problems in contrast to medicine for young people working with the older patient is much more demanding furthermore the complex issue of societal attitudes toward old people can come into play specifically the physician's need to deal with natural fears of aging dependency depression dementia and death ageism is the enemy of effective medical treatment at its best geriatrics exemplifies ways that medical care for all ages can become more humane problem oriented and holistic

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
